Defend Democracy Issue: Misinformation and Disinformation

The LWV Public Statements:

The upcoming presidential election will occur within a rapidly changing, intense, 24-hour news cycle. In an era where not all news is based in truth, the public can become more knowledgeable about basic fact-checking when consuming media.¹ The League of Women Voters encourages the public to develop a fact-checking routine to provide balance, opportunities for reflection on the essential issues of our time, and to engage with the League's Democracy Truth Project initiative. The Democracy Truth Project strengthens democracy by restoring trust in the electoral process by combating misand disinformation. The public is encouraged to understand how these two insidious tools are being used to undermine our democracy, as well as the potential impact of artificial intelligence of our elections.

What You Can Do:

- 1. Be an informed consumer of news.
 - Consider the source of your news. Are news outlets local or national? Is their coverage reliable or inconsistent? What organizations are funding them?
 - Be aware of your personal habits when consuming news. Seek out diverse, reputable sources and read from different perspectives.
 - Be mindful that misinformation runs rampant on social media due to the speed and scale in which it is shared.
 - Examine the objectivity and emotion in which facts are reported. News reporting should be free of bias and balanced.
 - Check the source and the date of an article. Check to see if other news outlets are also covering the issue. Read past the headline and question emotionally charged content.
- 2. Support the LWVUS Democracy Truth Project²
 - Understand the difference between misinformation (inadvertently sharing false information without the intention to harm), and disinformation (intentionally sharing false information with the intent to harm).
 - Don't engage on social media with inaccurate information. This only amplifies it further with likes, clicks, and shares. Instead, share accurate information in a separate, new post.
